From the Assistant Principal

Every day counts

Attendance at school provides children with opportunities to develop the basic skills for learning, and assists in the development of social skills including communication, self-esteem, teamwork and friendship building. There can be little argument with this statement. Attendance at school does not guarantee engagement with the work but it is an essential feature of learning.

We know, of course, that regular attendance assists learning. But what has not been able to be measured up, until now, is how large an effect absence has on learning.

The Australian Government recently conducted a detailed study of the relationship between attendance at school and student achievement. Some of the findings were:

- Average academic achievement on NAPLAN tests declined with **any** absence from school and continued to decline as absence rates increased. The data strongly suggests that **every day of attendance** in school contributes towards a child's learning,
- 2. There is no "safe" threshold. The effects of absence also accumulate over time. Absence from school was related to lower achievement in numeracy, reading and writing not only in the current year, but in **future years** as well.
- 3. Unauthorised absences had a significantly greater effect on achievement than authorised absence. Even small amounts of unauthorised absence from school were associated with substantial falls in average NAPLAN test scores.
- 4. Improvements in absence rates over time, particularly for unauthorised absences, protected students from falling further behind and in some cases were related to improvements in NAPLAN scores.

We know that absence from school is due to a number of factors and may at times be unavoidable due to illness or complex family situations. We also know that low attendance rates are a strong indicator of a student at risk.

Now that it is clear that any absence (authorised or not) has an effect on learning, we need to work together to ensure the best possible outcomes for students. Parents need to understand that when their child misses school it can have an ongoing impact on their learning. The school wants to support parents and provide opportunities for students to catch up when they have missed work. Some examples that we provide are Maths help and Homework and Assignment help that occur after school.


We will also provide more visible recognition of students with high attendance levels and more regular contact and follow up with families where attendance rates are below 95%.

One day of absence per fortnight (90% attendance) means a student misses 4 weeks of school a year. Across all years of school this equates to an entire school year lost. Every 5% increase in absence equals another 2 weeks of school lost per year. These effects accumulate over time.

A student with an attendance rate of 85% would have missed 6 weeks of school and across all years would equate to almost 2 years of schooling lost.

Let us, as a Franciscan community not only live our school motto "To Truth Through Love", but also live as true Franciscans and see that even in the weakest and most vulnerable, we are but masterpieces in God's creation.

The Gospel of Matthew

As mentioned in the last newsletter, as a community we are consolidating our understanding of scripture. Through consolidating our understanding we are opening up dialogue between students and teachers in regards to the context the Gospel is written for our community as well as trying to see how the scripture can be lived out in our daily lives. This year, we are widening the discussion to include parents of our students. We are asking each of you to engage with your student in discussing the Gospel and its meaning, and to post your reflections on the scripture through our school's Moodle page. This will be opened very soon. It is never to late to start this discussion, you will find that by opening the dialogue with your child, you may be enriched by their understanding and also in turn they be enriched by yours. From the Teaching & Learning Coordinator: Curriculum

Years 7-10 Assessment Handbooks are now available on the school website. They have also been placed on the school Moodle. These handbooks are designed to give students information about formal assessment procedures. Dates have been provided for all relevant assessments. Some assessment dates may be changed with sufficient notification of two weeks given to students due to changes in the school calendar.


Assessment is used to find out what a student needs to learn, how well a student is doing as a course progresses and how well a student did at the end of a unit. Assessment can be formal or informal. An example of informal assessment would be a teacher's judgement of the work completed in class or participation in a particular activity. Formal assessment can include tasks such as assignments, exams, research projects, performances, portfolios and practical tests. Formal assessment tasks include information on the outcomes that are being assessed and an indication of what students have to do to achieve a given grade.

I have included an extract from the Assessment Handbooks regarding student responsibilities. It is important that all students familiarise themselves with them. These are as follows:

- Speak with the Teaching and Learning Coordinator, or the Principal, if you are in doubt about the requirements of the Assessment Policy.
- Cooperate with the process of Assessment.
- Inform the school if you are to be absent on the day of an assessment task.
- Do not plagiarise (i.e. copy) other peoples' work. Malpractice or dishonesty will lead to a zero mark.
- Ensure that any questions about marks, grades or comments awarded for an individual piece of work are resolved at the time the work is handed back.
- Demonstrate that thorough effort and achievement have been met for the requirements of that course.
- Complete all assigned work to the best of your ability.
- · Complete the task on the set date that it is due. Penalties will apply for late submissions.

Students also have access to the Google school assessment calendar that outlines, on a term basis, all assessment dates. Students should familiarise themselves with these dates and make use of Homework Club that takes place every Tuesday afternoon between 2:30-3:30pm in the library to receive assistance from teachers in the completion of their tasks.

To the community that is St Agnes

Quite often in my life I have come across some stories and things that both amaze and inspire. Below is a story about some members of the St Agnes Family.

The story is about a family that has bestowed a great honour on us by sending their children here for us to teach. They have moved on and are living their lives, and to them I send my best wishes. The parents, however, have embarked on a new journey; a journey that is moving and truly thought provoking.

Enough from me, I think that it is best summed up in the words of a former student, Jasmin Kowe. This is her story.

Hi Mr Doran,

It was nice catching up with you the other night, as we discussed my parents Sharon and Chris Flynn have recently fostered 4 young children through the Barnardos 'find a family' program. I would like to take the opportunity to explain what they have gone through.

Originally my Mum, Sharon, met my Step Dad Chris at my Year 8 parent teacher interview night at St Agnes back in 2003. Myself, and my brother Dylan, attended St Agnes as well and my stepsister and stepbrother, Aimee and Joshua. So once my parents moved in together and we became a family there was 4 of us kids all attending St Agnes a modern day Brady Bunch as many family friends nicknamed us.

Once us older kids left school, got jobs and moved out of home, my parents talked about how different us kids had been raised and how they would have loved the opportunity to raise children together. As time went by my parents realised the house was now very quiet and large without us all there and began to look into the idea of adopting a child. They decided on this route as Chris himself was adopted and had a very positive experience and liked the idea of providing that to a child.

They found the 'Find a Family' program through Barnardos which of all the agencies seemed the most reputable and suited what they were looking for best. This is where they started the process; the idea of the program is to foster the children (already deemed by the courts to never be returned to their parents) while the adoption process takes place.

There were many interviews and courses involved, as Barnardos wants to make sure people are doing this for the right reasons as well as assessing their capabilities. In one of the interviews my parents were asked if they would consider taking siblings, as Barnardos likes to try to keep sibling groups together where possible. Without hesitation or discussion they both said they would be happy to take a sibling group, they had seen us kids grow up together and knew how close and important a sibling relationship is.

From there they went through many course days and many, many more interviews, which also included us four adult kids being interviewed also. After all the information was gathered they had a formal interview and it was decided by Barnardos that my parents were approved for 'up to 4' children. From this point my parents were paired with a family of 4 boys ages being 8, 3, 2 & 1.

They then had play dates where they got to meet the kids and take them to dinner and fun activities like bowling and the park. This then progressed into sleepovers as moving day grew closer. On the 6th of January 2017 the kids officially moved in. This was a big change on the household but Mum and Dad have coped very well, especially seen as only after 1 week mum had a fall and now has a broken leg. Still this did not stop them, they just need a little extra help now, but all us older kids are happy to chip in.

All through everything they are the most amazing people, they actually get embarrassed when they are praised for what they are doing. My mum and Dad said they just see it as they had the extra room, time and love to give and wanted to be able to make a difference in a child's life and were lucky enough to get to make a change in 4 little boys lives.

People ask all the time "Why four?" My parents believe because they were approved for up to 4 children by Barnardos after months of intense interviews and studies, it would be a disservice to not take all four. The children's case manager (who has been with them from the start) said she is just so pleased as they did not think they would find a family willing to keep the 4 children together.

The transition process depending on the kids can usually take months but the boys are now into a set routine and have settled in. Many people will adopt/ foster which is such a wonderful selfless thing to do, I am just amazed and in awe of my parents as they have taken 4 so that a family doesn't have to be separated. It is a huge undertaking but has made

our family closer and stronger than ever.

We can't praise the Barnardos agency enough as they made the process so straightforward and continue to provide so much support to my parents even now.

If there are any questions you have just let me know, I am very proud of them and am happy to tell people about this amazing thing they are doing.

Ask WHAT when kids act up

"Asking WHY when kids misbehave generally closes down a conversation and puts them on the defensive. There's a better question to ask when kids behave poorly. Ask a question beginning with 'WHAT?"

WHY

Why on earth did you do that?

Most of us have said this to our kids at some stage.

They hurt a sibling and we say, 'Why?'

They argue and fight at the meal table and we say, 'Why?' They deliberately come home from an outing later than agreed and we say, 'Why?'

This is a natural reaction. But often kids can't articulate why they have done the wrong thing. Boys, in particular, will usually reply. 'I dunno.' They know something isn't right, but articulating it is another matter

Besides, asking WHY is pointless

Even if they give you a reason for their poor behaviour ('cos she hit me first', 'I'm not hungry anyway', 'I was late because I lost track of time') where do you go to from there?

Asking WHY when kids misbehave generally closes down a conversation and puts them on the defensive.

There's a better question to ask when kids behave poorly. Ask a question beginning with 'WHAT?'

Okay, your first reaction to misbehaviour maybe 'What the..... but hold that thought in. Better to ask questions such as:

- WHAT were you thinking when you hurt your sister? .
- WHAT were you doing when you decided to stay out late?
- WHAT was happening when you argued with your friend?
- WHAT should you have done when you didn't want to eat and cided to annoy your sister?
- WHAT will you do next time when you feel like acting like that?
- WHAT do you think your brother meant when he said that you were.....?
- WHAT will you do now to make it up to your brother?

These types of questions are reflective and restorative. They require children to reflect on their thinking, their behaviou and the situation at hand. This opens up conversations that lead to learning.

Effective discipline helps children learn better ways of behaving. Some of the questions lead children to the important aspect of repairing or **restoring** relationships they may have damaged through their behaviour and so take some responsibility for the way they acted. Taking responsibility and making an another vital aspect of discipline.

Importantly, asking what? when kids' misbehaviour impacts on others leads them further down the road from self interest to social interest, where they consider the well-being of others. It's also in line with the types of questions teachers are asking your children when their behaviour adversely affects others.

The origins of Valentine's Day

St Valentine was a 3rd Century priest living in Rome during the time Emperor Claudius II passed an Edict forbidding the marriage of young people. Claudius II did this because he believed unmarried men made better soldiers than married ones, and to ensure the quality of his soldiers in battle. he banned marriage. The news of the ban came as a huge surprise to the Romans but there was hope because Valentine defied the order and went on to perform secret weddings for many young couples. Eventually, he was caught and imprisoned for not following the command of the Emperor. Legend has it that the prison guard's blind daughter was brought over to Valentine where he prayed and healed her.

On the 14th February, 269AD, Valentine was stoned and beheaded because he supported the marriage of Christians. May his prayers be with us.
