Research shows that learning outcomes improve when there is shared understanding between teachers and parents of the processes that lead to improved learning and wellbeing in the classroom. Positive links between school and the home provide young people with more effective assistance and encouragement.

Parents have an important stake in the education of their children and play a significant part in supporting their children's learning.

Where there is particularly effective parental involvement, the single most important driver is the enthusiasm of the principal. When a school plans and implements positive policies to involve parents, this can have a significant impact on improving students' behaviour and attendance.

Parental involvement can range from a school being described as the 'hub' of the community where parents, including those from disadvantaged groups, feel very welcome in the school and await the next project with enthusiasm to a school where parents are rarely involved beyond a few formal events.

Some findings:

- most parents help their children with reading and homework
- a few parents get involved in the school spontaneously, particularly those who are confident and well educated
- every school reported that mothers are more likely to become involved in the school than fathers
- those with successful records of parental involvement realise the importance of extended family networks and of including grandparents especially.
- Only a very few schools have a consistent approach that results in high levels of parental involvement across a wide range of activities.

Good practice was mostly in areas where the school had been proactive, had listened to parents, refined its work to take account of their suggestions and built on activities it considered successful.

Where there is good practice in planning parental involvement, schools understand that parents:

- like to be involved in their child's school and want to feel they are in partnership
 - want the school to know them personally as individuals and be kept well informed about the progress made by their children
 - need to receive clear information about day-to-day matters that affect their children
 - feel more confident if they know the staff and have a basic understanding of the curriculum
 - are very willing to support school events and provide practical help but are less likely to join a committee
 - become more supportive the more they are involved, particularly if they have attended training events

a diverse community learning together • like to have clear rules for their children that are applied consistently and are followed up appropriately, for example regarding behaviour in the playground or expectations for completing homework.

Schools can make efforts to:

- ensure that staff build positive relationships with parents by being visible and approachable in the school and the playground, particularly at the start and end of the school day
- involve parents in initiatives to improve students' attendance and behaviour by making expectations and rules very clear, rewarding students who improve and including parents in celebrations of success
- use parents as volunteers during the school day and in after school hours learning where appropriate
- involve extended family members as volunteers, including grandparents who often have skills to share and time to spare
- provide more information for parents, for example by making newsletters more attractive and accessible, by using simple and multilingual text, websites, email and text messaging, and including information about and written by students
- provide parents with a full range of information that includes appropriate details about enrolment or when there are staff changes or absences
- monitor and promote gender and ethnic balance on governing bodies and encourage fathers to become more involved
- be imaginative and innovative in planning how they could involve parents more effectively, particularly parents who may need help to develop parenting skills.

Some parents are fearful of a school environment. Some may have a history of personal failure at school. This can create a barrier to their involvement and also their ability to support their children. Parents' self-esteem is raised when they are able to contribute to school life. When parents attend workshops they often become more knowledgeable and supportive.

Parents like the principal and staff to be highly visible and available. In the best practice they describe the school as 'being like a family'. Parents say that they like a personal approach and appreciate the school making contact so they can help to resolve difficulties with their children.

Parents like the school to make opportunities for them to get to know their child's teacher early in the school year and then feel comfortable talking with them.

Improving communication

All parents like to be well informed and appreciate it when the school makes an effort to keep them informed.

Schools do this in different way. For some schools, meetings and workshops provide good opportunities. Other schools prefer to use newsletters, text messaging and email.

Parents like newsletters that contain information about what their children's classes are doing and that include students' contributions as well as more general information.

Almost all schools aim to produce correspondence in a style that is straightforward for the reader.

When parents work with the school to find a solution to a problem they have more confidence in the school's willingness to address difficult issues.

Parents report that schools could be better at ensuring that parents are fully aware of arrangements to cover for absent staff, for example during maternity leave. Parents and students can feel particularly uneasy in these circumstances and are more likely to be supportive of the school if they know what is going on.

Most schools feel they involve parents well but such judgments are difficult to prove. One way is by using questionnaires effectively. Schools that do this well devise questions that are specific to their particular circumstances.

Friday 21 March 2014 is the national day of Action Against Bullying and Violence.

The National Safe Schools Framework defines bullying as repeated verbal, physical, social or psychological behaviour that is harmful and involves the misuse of power by an individual or group towards one or more persons.

Cyberbullying refers to bullying through information and communication technologies, e.g. the Internet or mobile devices. Conflicts or fights between equals and single incidents are not defined as bullying. Bullying of any form or for any reason can have long-term effects on those involved, including bystanders.

In short, bullying is a repeated pattern of harmful verbal, physical or social behaviour, which involves the misuse of power.

Below are some interesting facts about bullying taken from the government anti-bullying site "No Way" <u>http://www.bullyingnoway.gov.au/</u>.

- Approximately one in four Years 4 to 9 Australian students (27%) report being bullied every few weeks or more, often during the last term at school.
- Frequent school bullying is highest among Year 5 (32%) and Year 8 (29%) students.
- 83% of students who bully others online, also bully others offline.
- 84% of students who were bullied online were also bullied offline.
- Peers are present as onlookers in 87% of bullying interactions, and play a central role in the bullying process.
- Hurtful teasing was the most prevalent of all bullying behaviours experienced by students, followed by having hurtful lies told about them.

St Agnes is committed to the provision of a safe and caring learning environment. Effective learning cannot occur unless this is the case. Students who have a tendency to bully should be aware that the school will act strongly in response to reported cases of bullying. Students who do not feel comfortable with the actions of other students should report to their Assistant Stage Coordinator or Stage Coordinator, either in person or via email. The "No Way" site has a range of resources for students, parents and teachers.

2014 National Assessment Program - Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN)

In May 2014, the National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) will be completed by all students in Years 7 and 9. NAPLAN has the support of all State and Territory Education Ministers and will assess the literacy and numeracy learning of students in all Australian schools.

The results of the tests will provide us with important information about what each student can achieve, and this information will be used to support our teaching and learning programs. Parents will receive a report indicating their child's level of achievement.

Each student's level of achievement will be reported against the national minimum standard.

Year 7	Language Conventions* 45 minutes Writing 40 minutes	Reading 65 minutes	Numeracy ** 40 minutes x 2 (80 mins total)	
Year 9	Language Conventions* 45 minutes Writing 40 minutes	Reading 65 minutes	Numeracy ** 40 minutes x 2 (80 mins total)	

The tests will be conducted across Australia for all students from 13-15 May 2014.

*Language Conventions incorporates Spelling, Grammar and Punctuation.

** Numeracy incorporates Number, Algebra, Function and Pattern, Chance and Data, Measurement and Space.

In the Numeracy tests students do not require any measuring tools such as rulers or protractors. There will be two Numeracy tests: one where a calculator is allowed and one where calculators are not to be used. For the calculator test, the student should use the calculator that they currently use at school.

A 'catch-up' day is scheduled on Friday 16th May for students who missed a test or were absent on a test day. Additional information about NAPLAN can be found at www.nap.edu.au/NAPLAN/Parent_Carer_support/index.html

All students are to take these examinations seriously and do their best. Whilst students have been practicing answering NAPLAN style questions at school, I also encourage parents to spend time at home with their children preparing for these examinations. There are numerous websites that provide access to sample papers and are a good source of revision. One of the better sites can be found at http://www.qsa.qld.edu.au/24629.html.

Busways Announcement

Busways has notified us that the practice of issuing a temporary bus pass to students who lose their bus pass has ceased and bus drivers will not accept them as of 24 March 2014.

In line with the NSW Governments Terms and Conditions of Issue, students who cannot produce a valid 2014 bus pass when boarding a Busways service will be expected to pay the appropriate fare for that trip; otherwise travel may be refused.

To be eligible for a free school bus pass an secondary school applicant must be:

- A NSW resident
- A student who lives more than 2 kms (radial distance) from school, or 2.9 kms or more by the most direct practical walking route to the nearest entry point to the school

Conditions of free travel:

- Free travel is only available between the student's home and school on school days for the purpose of school attendance
- Passes are not transferable
- Passes must be shown when boarding the bus and when requested during travel
- Travel by bus is subject to the conditions laid down by Transport NSW governing the carriage of passengers on privately operated bus services, includ- ing adhering to the Code of Conduct

This report may also be of some assistance: Guidelines for managing school student's behaviour on buses.

Applying for a free school bus pass

An application form needs to be filled out by the applying student's parent/guardian and handed in to their school. Application forms are available from the school office. A new application must be completed when a student:

- Progresses from Year 6 to Year 7
- Changes their name, school and/or address

Replacing lost or stolen passes

A lost or stolen Busways school bus pass can be replaced at Blacktown Busways depot - 150 Glendenning Road, Glendenning Ph: 9625 8900 or on the <u>Busways website</u>, by payment of a fee (currently \$15.00).

If your child is ineligible for a free school bus pass

Term passes give students who are not eligible for a Busways School Free Travel pass the opportunity to travel to and from school without having to pay a fare every day and at a reduced cost (currently \$51.00 per term). This pass is convenient for those students who may live close to school but want to catch the bus, either all the time or occasionally, for example when it is raining. Term passes can be bought at your local Busways depot or on the Busways website.

School Student Transport Scheme Appeals Process

If a student has been deemed ineligible to be granted subsidised travel by the school or operator, the first step is for parents/guardian to reapply in writing to the Transport for NSW Office at Parramatta (address below), setting out the reasons why subsidised travel should be provided. Should Transport for NSW not approve subsidised travel and parents/guardian believe that there are special circumstances such as safety and/or hardship issues, they can appeal the Transport for NSW's decision by completing and submitting an <u>SSTS Appeals Panel application form</u> to SSTS Appeals Panel, PO Box K659, Haymarket NSW 1240.

Quality Catholic Schooling Survey

All Catholic schools in the Diocese of Parramatta will be participating in the Quality Catholic Schooling (QCS) project in 2014.

As it did in 2012 and 2013, the QCS survey will provide data from students, staff and parents about our school's cultural behaviour, relationships and learning community and will assist us to focus our efforts for improvement by building on our successes to date.

Every staff member and student, and 60 randomly selected parents, will be asked to complete a survey. Staff and students will complete the survey online at school.

Parents have been sent home a paper survey but will also be able to complete the survey online if preferred. The survey will take about 20-30 minutes to complete.

The survey data will be kept strictly confidential and no individual will be identified to the school or the Catholic Education Office.
